#### ***Tess Davis: Executive Director—Antiquities Coalition***

Tess Davis, a lawyer and archaeologist by training, is Executive Director of the Antiquities Coalition. She oversees the organization's work to fight cultural racketeering and also manages the day-to-day operations of the institute's staff in Washington, DC, as well as programs overseas. . Since 2013, Davis has been affiliated with the Scottish Centre for Crime and Justice Research, at the University of Glasgow. She came to Scotland from the Lawyers' Committee for Cultural Heritage Preservation — a not-for-profit institution based in Washington, DC — where she was Executive Director until 2012. She previously worked for the nongovernmental organization Heritage Watch in Cambodia, first as Project Coordinator, and finally Assistant Director. In addition, Ms. Davis teaches cultural property law at Johns Hopkins University and Tulane University School of Law, and is a member of the New York State bar, as well as a Term Member of the Council on Foreign Relations.



#### ***Liz Fraccaro: Project Director—Antiquities Coalition***

Liz Fraccaro is a trained archaeologist and lawyer, and Project Director of the Antiquities Coalition's Financial Crimes Task Force. Ms. Fraccaro had extensive experience in museum collections and field archaeology before attending law school, where she concentrated on art, museum, and cultural heritage law. . Ms. Fraccaro has worked with the Art Law Centre at the University of Geneva, clerked with the general counsel at the Institute of Museum and Library Sciences, the general counsel of the Field Museum of Natural History, and the Chicago History Museum. Ms. Fraccaro is dedicated to preserving and protecting cultural heritage worldwide and contributes expertise in the legal dimensions of cultural heritage management and international human rights.
